YOU don't know about the triple chocolate cream ginger nut surprise biscuit? You will, you will.

In a hilarious pastiche of every wartime propaganda film, show or radio broadcast, The Foundry Group pretends that the TCCGNSB is likely to subvert the population by sheer deliciousness and ruin a society which was happy to eat dull biscuits with a few holes and a dusting of sugar on top.

Their musical comedy show The Ministry of Biscuits, by Philip Reeve and Brian Mitchell, was actually written 20 ago.

But the jokes get better with age and distance from wartime Britain.

Even if the recorded score from Eric Coates is a little unfamiliar to young audiences today, everyone knows about keeping calm and carrying on.

A wonderful cast send everything up mostly with a straight face, although David Mountfield as the caddish Babbington has a terrible time not laughing.

Especially when his protective headgear from the fall-out of TCCGNSB keeps collapsing.

Murray Simon is an excellent "poisson froide", initially resistant to the antics of secret spy Amy Sutton in her guise as seductive Mata Hari and then refusing to fall in love with her once she is unmasked as Miss Braithwaite.

Author Brian Mitchell plays his Biscuit Minister with aplomb – a Gilbertian to his striped trousers, he is responsible for the Savoy-style patter songs and neat rhyming lists of everything from place names to biscuit styles.

Pianist Andy Smith accompanies with gusto, clearly relishing good strong melodies such as Nobody Wants To Know and providing a rhythmic bounce to songs and dances.

It is all terrific fun and a very entertaining evening.

And if you didn't think, when you were out walking your whippet, much about Highland shortbread or Rich Tea dunkers, you might now.
